From Our Ice Technician's Desk

Hello! My name is Jon Wall, owner of WALL-2-WALL Ice. WALL-2-WALL Ice is a locally owned and operated company providing facilities and events with ice making services. Aside from that, we are the Eastern Ontario Distributor and Representative for Jet Ice and Canada Curling Stone Company.

Growing up in the Ottawa Valley (Arnprior and of course, Renfrew), I was an avid curler. Once I moved to Ottawa to attend Algonquin College for a degree in Recreation Facilities Management, I was introduced to the ice making industry. From there, I set out in 2010 on my own business venture known as WALL-2-WALL Ice. After a few years of making ice in Ottawa, the opportunity came up to help out a home town rink with ice making services in the fall of 2014. Since then, I have been providing the Renfrew Curling Club with an array of services. An Icemaker for a curling facility installs the ice at the beginning of each season, preforms daily ice maintenance in terms of pebbling and scraping, mid-season ice resurfacing in the form of floods or controlled melts, then finishes the year with the ice removal process. In all of that, I provide the club with ice installation, mid-season maintenance and ice removal. On top of that, I also provide the club with training clinics for pebbling and scraping. Whether it be myself, or the club's volunteer ice makers, here a few helpful tips to keep the ice clean and free of 'curlers' debris.

- 1. Replace broom heads, gloves and grippers regularly, not annually or worse never.
- Take your 'curling' clothes home and wash regularly, not annually.
- 3. Wear appropriate curling attire (nothing that could shed lint, glitter, down feathers, etc and no jeans!)

4. Be mindful of hands and knee prints, they can only be fixed with water which takes time to freeze and cannot be done in between games.

- 5. Keep your beverages on the back boards and not on the ice, hot or cold, if spilled they are not good for the ice.
- 6. Do not wear your curling shoes outside, you will track in unwanted dirt and salt onto the ice.
- 7. Do not lift the rocks, they are meant to slide on the ice. If you drop it, damage to the stone and the ice can happen.
- 3. Catch the rocks before they hit the boards and worse, the hacks. This damages the playing surface that requires a lengthy time to repair.

Measuring Accurately

With all things, there's a correct way to measure. To start lets talk about which devise to use. Unless the rocks are close to the button the measureing stick (biter bar) is used. There are 2 measuring sticks at Renfrew located on each of the side walls. The laser should only be used when the rocks are close to the button. When using the measuring stick:

- Lift the device with two hands. The right hand holds the device near the pin.
- Approach the house from the hack (back). Avoid walking near or over any rocks in play.
 - Set the device down in the house away from the rocks (90 degrees away if possible). Lower the right hand last and set the point outside of the pin. Gently slide the point into the pin.
- 4. Turn the nob on the measure display to loosen and move it away from the inside of the rocks.
- Move the device clockwise with a single finger to one of the rocks to be measured. Never press down on the bar as this may deflect the device and change the measure.
- Move the display to a position where it is touching the rock and reads a measurement.
- Move the device clockwise with a single finger to the next rock to be measured.
- If the measurement is still in dispute continue to move the device clockwise all the way around and measue both stones again
- Never pass back over a rock. Never swing the device counter clock wise. Each pass along a rock has the potential to move the rock.

To measue with the laser:





- Place the pin of the laser measure in the center hole of the house.
- 2. Aim the laser measure at the stone you want to measure. The red dot should hit the center of the stone on the striking band
- Turn on the laser beam by pressing the red arrow button.
- Slowly move the laser dot across the center of the stone's striking band.
- Watch the display for the lowest number and press the red arrow button to hold it.
- Compare the measurement of the first rock to the second.
